DEMOCRACY DAY

In collaboration with campus partners, <u>J</u>HU hosted its first-ever Democracy Day, an event designed to prompt first and second years to think critically about the political world they inhabit and their own rights and responsibilities as citizens.

Henderson Hopkins Partnership School

Henderson-Hopkins school has partnered with the Maryland Food Bank and World Central Kitchen to provide weekly food distributions at the K-8 school in East Baltimore. Each week volunteers assemble and distribute packages of food to community members.

March thru April, the Center partnered with Henderson Hopkins to provide education, action, reflections, and transportation to and from the school for students.

ABSENTEE BALLOT PARTY

To make sure that every Hopkins' voice is heard, the Center for Social Concern hosted a Hopkins Vote: Absentee Ballot party in April, an effort to ensure that every eligible voter has the knowledge and resources they need to participate in the democratic process in the United States of America.



The Center for Social Concern's programs engaged differently with community-based organizations and community members as the COVID-19 pandemic continued. Appropriate social distancing was practiced as recommended by public health guidelines.

As a result, all CSC programming during the academic year returned to inperson. Hopkins Engage, powered by GivePulse, is the university's community engagement platform. It allowed us to capture impact data reflected in this report of all students who recorded their service and activities on the platform. The programs of the CSC encourage long-term engagement in the Baltimore community through summer and academic year internships, cohortbased service, and weekly tutoring opportunities.

Although JHU Take Action and Hopkins Votes combined amount to less than 2% of the total impact, these short-term service opportunities serve as a catalyst for CSC students to begin their journey toward active citizenship. These programs are invaluable for CSC community partners—providing the people power needed to complete oneoff capacity-building projects.

Baltimore First

Baltimore First is the Center for Social Concern's individualized direct service and volunteering program. We are committed to building mutually beneficial relationships with Baltimore-based community organizations. Baltimore First provides these organizations with weekly, bi-weekly, and monthly student volunteers.

The program selected eight strategic community partners during the 2021-2022 academic year focused on environmental sustainability, disability justice, community health, youth empowerment, educational equity, and housing and community development. Partners included were:








Charm City Science League

Charm City Science League (CCSL) aims to increase academic performance in Baltimore City middle and high schools, particularly focusing on STEM science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) education. The program will inspire Baltimore City Middle School students through intensive one-on-one mentoring and Science Olympiad competitions in biology, chemistry, physics, environmental science, engineering, and technology.

During the academic year, the program mentored 130 Baltimore students, serving eight middle schools and four high schools. The demographics of students involved in CSC Student Organizations are as follows. Forty-four students are from the Krieger School of Arts and Sciences, 33 enrolled in the Whiting School of Engineering, and one enrolled in the School of Public Health, including seven FLI students.



Community Impact Internships Program



The Community Impact Internships Program is a summer internship program that pairs undergraduate students with non-profit organizations and government agencies to work on community-identified projects in Baltimore. Students and community partners also have the opportunity to extend their connections into the academic year through CIIP Extension.

The program offers an intensive, cohort-based learning environment. Internships focus on community-identified projects in Baltimore, and run from June to August. The demographics of students who participated are as follows. Seventy-eight enrolled in the Krieger School of Arts and Sciences, nine enrolled in the Whiting School of Engineering, one enrolled in Peabody, and four enrolled in Public Health, including four student-athletes and twelve FLI students.

Tutorial Project




DEMOGRAPHICS

The Tutorial Project student demographics are as follows: 121 enrolled in the Krieger School of Arts and Sciences, 42 enrolled in the Whiting School of Engineering, one enrolled in the Peabody,, including four student-athletes, and 18 FLI students.

The Tutorial Project is an after-school tutoring program that provides academic support for elementary school students (grades 1-5). Children are paired with Johns Hopkins University students and receive oneon-one help in reading and math.

A Common First-Year Experience occurs during Intersession, where students can take a week-long Baltimore-based course that focuses on one specialized topic. It's an opportunity for first-year students to enhance their education and be immersed in civic, cultural, and artistic landscapes. There are also evening cultural activities.

The B'More Program was held January 18-21, 2022, and approximately 44 undergraduates registered. Due to low enrollment numbers during the pandemic, the change from in-person community engagement to virtual reduced the number of course offerings to five for Intersession.



France-Merrick Civic Fellowship

Upon return to campus in September, the 2021-22 Fellowship cohort began monthly programming that included project planning, community partner collaboration, and required meetings with assigned CSC staff mentors. With their community partners, Fellows participated in 5-10 hours of engagement per week as they explored their project and interacted with their community partner. They recorded 618 hours of direct service in 2021-22 while working with their community partners. Projects ranged from designing and executing a community health survey, to state level policy writing and advocacy, to drafting a white paper on opportunities to improve transit equity within Baltimore City, and the support for the organization of educational opportunities for families in Southwest Baltimore.



The FMCF student demographics are as follows. Six enrolled in the Krieger School of Arts and Sciences, including 1 FLI student.





Students may apply to be placed with an approved community partner organization and gain the skills and community connections afforded by a non-profit internship at no cost to the community partner organization. Students may participate for a semester or academic year with their service site.



Student Organizations

Of the 400+ student organizations under Student Affairs, those with an expressly servicefocused mission are recognized and advised by the CSC. Each organization is paired with a CSC staff member as an advisor to support the student leadership development, policy understanding/adherence, risk management, partnership development, and transition planning for each organization. The Center convenes the Civic Engagement Recognition and Allocations Commission (CERAC), a group of 5 undergraduate students, to review budget proposals each spring and make recommendations for funding annually.



The demographics of students involved in CSC Student Organizations are as follows. One hundred seventy-one students are from the Krieger School of Arts and Sciences, sixty-nine enrolled in the Whiting School of Engineering, three enrolled in the School of Public Health, including six student-athletes and twenty-three FLI students.








HopkinsCORPS

The HopkinsCORPS pre-orientation program is an immersive, service-learning, and leadership development experience for incoming first-year JHU students. HopkinsCORPS participants gain a deeper understanding of social justice issues and civic engagement as they relate to Baltimore City through a series of educational workshops, direct service projects with community partners, reflection sessions, and leadership development activities.

Hopkins Votes


STATS OVER THE PAST YEAR

Hopkins Votes is a nonpartisan effort that engages students, staff, faculty, and alumni in fostering a university-wide environment that promotes voter education and engagement for local, state, and national elections. It makes sure all students who are eligible to vote are equipped with the resources and knowledge they need to make their voices heard.

More information will be available once the JHU 2020 NSLVE report is released this summer; in the meantime, the following survey results are Hopkins Votes' most accurate barometer to student voting for the 2020 election. In response to an HSA undergraduate survey during the 2020 election cycle, over 1500 undergraduates confirmed that they were registered. These students either had already cast their ballot or planned to do so.











FLI students were heavily involved in CSC programs and events. This year, 96 FLI students served 4,656 hours for an economic impact of \$145,686.24.





ATHLETICS



Student-athletes participate in the CSC's programs and events. Twenty-one athletes served 599 hours for an impact of \$19,344. The hours served per team and the number of athletes who participated per team are shown below. The demographics of athletes who participated are as follows: Sixteen enrolled in the Krieger School of Arts and Sciences, and two enrolled in the Whiting School of Engineering.
