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Should Medical School Be Shortened to Three Years?



The chance of finishing medical school early is gaining attention from students with a large amount of debt. The median debt for medical school graduates in 2013 was \$175,000

Three years seems like a great option for primary-care physicians to avoid the extra amount of debt that can go up to \$70,000.

Critics of the three year medical plan argue that the 4th year is crucial to applying to fellowships and being placed in and applying for residencies. So far only 12 out of the 124 medical schools in the USA are offering a 3 year program, and this is number is rapidly increasing.

Some medical schools are producing programs of their own in replacement or similar to the 3 year plan for certain students, like Columbia's programs for Biology Phd's






